

# 2024 FARM BILL MARKER BILL TRACKER As of June 12, 2024

The Native Farm Bill Coalition (NFBC) has published more than 150 priorities in its report entitled, "<u>Gaining Ground: A Report on the 2018 Farm</u> <u>Bill Successes for Indian Country and Opportunities for 2023</u>." Below is a summary of draft language that has been circulated by Congressional offices and marker bills that have been introduced to-date. The NFBC has provided input or helped draft marker bills noted in the green tracker.
